The 50 Year Vigil of the Grave

Ten years ago, a grave in the cemetery caught my wife's attention. It was close to the graves we visited... my wife went to read the inscription. It was the grave of a girl named Marjorie. She was only 3 years old when she died in 1935.

My wife's name is Marjorie also, and that may have been a small reason for our interest in the grave. But it was the date of death that struck us. Although the child had died in 1935, forty two years later... there were beautiful, tended flowers growing on the grave.


Whenever we went to the cemetery we visited this grave. We saw flowers growing there every summer for the next eight years. We never saw the person who planted and tended the flowers. We guessed it to be the girl's mother, whose date of death was yet unwritten on the family stone.

The flowers appeared until 1985, 50 years after the child had died.

That summer there were no flowers.... And the date of death appeared on the mother's headstone.

An Open Letter from a Mother to Her Daughter in Heaven on Her Birthday

Skyward. Skyward. Nine years of looking for a special star that I can call your very own for just a little while in the wee hours of the morning of August 26th, as I commemorate your early morning birth each year. This year marks twenty-five years since that glorious event. I have always wanted to be the first to wish you a Happy Birthday, and the year 2004 will be no different. I'll be out looking for that star.

I can't believe I've lived this long. Truthfully, I haven't lived this long, but I think I'm living now. I don't know when my life engine restarted after you died, but it did, almost in spite of me, I think. There is hope. I see that now. Sometimes I can't help but resist it. It's just easier for me – so strong is the force of grief and of my missing you. But, I'm beginning to see what I didn't know before – that at some point in my grief journey, it becomes my choice, whether to live and how to live. Not every day, and certainly not in the early years when I won't apologize for not having had control of anything, but at some point in my grief and life journey, it is my choice. I'm going to try and make some good choices in your memory; I'm going to try to do some "living for two," as I did 25 years ago.

That doesn't mean that life is the same. It will never ever be the same. I'm not even yet sure if it will ever be as good. Even after eight years, for me it's too early to tell. But, at least I know my life engine is revving much of the time, and for now, I'll take that as progress. As you know, I've relaxed my standards since your death.

Your friends are thinking babies and careers and how you juggle the two. It's a challenge you'll never face, but you are influencing their choices as they sort out their lives. Your friends and mine tell me all the time of how your life and death have made a positive difference in their lives. For that I am sincerely thankful, but I wish there had been some other way. Someday I hope I can just be thankful, but I'm not there yet, and there always seem to be the "but I wish" endings for my thoughts.

Your blonde curly hair. Your gorgeous smile. Your contagious giggles. Your outrageous laugh. Your loving ways. Your generous nature. Your gift of sincere friendship. You. I miss you, birthday girl. The best I can do is to send my love and to hope that it reaches you somehow. Happy Birthday, my dear Cortney. I love you. (Hope you get a kiss from Traci, although I wish she were sending her love as I am.)

P.S. Watch out for the love thoughts coming your way – there are so many who still remember you on your birthday.

SUMMER VACATIONS

There is not a lot written about vacation time even though this can be a very difficult time. I remember so well the first July vacation we took after Ruthie's death in April. I could not face going and "leaving her" and going to all the places we had been in the past with her. That is one of the firsts - here are some hints that may help if you are dreading vacation time. By the way, there is never a time that you don't think of vacations past but the memories get less painful and you begin to forge new memories.

WHERE DO WE GO? There is no good answer for that. Yes, if you go where you have always gone on vacations, memories will flood in. But if you choose a totally new place, we found that you wonder how she would have liked it here, what would she have done, etc. So, you take your choice and expect the feelings and plan for them!

WHAT DO WE DO IF WE VISIT RELATIVES? Talk to them. Tell them that it is hard and that it is all right to talk about your child - when they see that you welcome hearing the name and Having them share memories they have, everyone can relax.

WILL I FORGET HER/HIM? Don't fear! You can never forget just because you are away from home memories. Don't be afraid to talk about her/him and let them be part of things


TRAVELING COMPANION. Remember that you can not really leave your grief at home when you go on vacation. It will go with you. Plan for it and pack for it. Don't overschedule the days and activities - you won't feel like doing as much perhaps, as usual and you may tire more easily. Take along some reading material - perhaps on grief, but take some light reading too.

Just remember that bereaved families and people need a respite from the daily stresses of work and of life and grief. Also know that often the anticipation is worse than the actual event. If you have been through Christmas, a birthday or death anniversary, etc., you may remember that the weeks or days before may be worrisome and you may not be sure how you will get through it but, suddenly the day is there and over and it wasn't as bad as you expected... even if it was bad.

So just decide when and where the vacation will be, plan ahead, and go. Allow yourself to enjoy it! Often we feel guilty if we have a good time.

Remember how much your child enjoyed trips and life and know that she or he would want you to do the same!
