Please allow 6 weeks to be sure it arrives in time for the appropriate month.

MEETING TOPICS—ANNAPOLIS

January 5: Blessings that Our Children Brought to Us

As we grieve the death of our child, particularly in the early days, weeks, and months, all we can feel and experience is the dreadful loss and pain from the death. Marlen Maier will talk about how, In dealing with that grief, it can be helpful to remember the blessings we received by having that child.

February 2: Using Music in Dealing with Grief

Some bereaved parents find music can be helpful in dealing with their grief. Paul Balasic will relate his experiences with music in his grief journey and talk about the role he believes music can play in the grief process. Members are urged to bring CDs or cassette tapes with music they have found particularly meaningful and helpful as they deal with their grief. We will use these as part of the discussion in our nonnewly bereaved sharing group.

Questions and Answers for Bereaved Siblings

"All of a sudden I burst into tears and cannot control my crying"

You have the freedom to cry when you need to—and to leave the room when you wish.

"I feel so guilty that I yelled at my brother. We would fight about the silliest things. I'll never be able to tell him how sorry I am."

Brothers and sisters in every family quarrel and don't apologize after every argument. Even though you fought, you still loved your brother and he loved you.

"I can't concentrate. I can't think and I can't remember a thing. I think I am losing my mind."

You have not lost your mind, although it may feel that way. Your mind is probably just overloaded. Not only do you have to continue to go through your daily routine, but your mind is flooded with thoughts and feelings for your brother or sister. This is temporary. Your memory and concentration will return.

"I can't remember exactly how she looks. Does this mean I am forgetting her?"

No, even if your sister was still alive you wouldn't be able to recall everything about her. It is natural to forget some details, but many gestures and memories will be in your heart forever.

"Why am I so mad at my sister for dying? She left me all alone. I know it wasn't her fault. I feel so quilty about being angry."

At some time, everyone is angry at the person who died - just as when they were alive. Anger does not mean that you loved them less. It means the loss is so great you want the terrible pain to end.

Editor's note


