Halloween used to be one of my favorite holidays. I enjoyed creating for costumes for my family so much that as we went out to trick or treat I was already coming up with ideas for the following year! My photo albums show happy pictures of my sons over the years that they dressed up together - the American Indian and the court jester; the army soldier and the air force captain, the wolf-man and the Telletubby. From sorting (and tasting) the candy to putting up the decorations, I always had as much fun as my children did. But after my youngest son died, I felt very differently.

Decorations that used to seem clever and even comical at times now made me look away. The coffins, the R.I.P tombstones, skeletons, ghosts - the morbid images suddenly seemed too dark and ghastly. We had already experienced true horror when we lost our cherished son and brother. In our first year I think I stayed in bed that night (I can't even remember), leaving candy out in a bowl to avoid hearing the doorbell ring and then seeing the faces of children who would be happily asking for some treats. Now, a few years down the road, I am comforted to see our eldest son having a laugh as he dresses up with his buddies. I am ready to hear the bell ring and see the little children in their precious costumes. But while I've learned to accept Halloween again and what it means to the rest of the neighborhood, for me October 31st has lost its magic.

As a bereaved parent, I've learned that masks are not exclusively reserved for Halloween. When the initial shock of my son's death abated and I felt ready to go out and face the world again, I learned to put on the mask of the functioning adult and parent of my surviving son. The passing stranger asks, "How are you?" and I wonder if they would *really* want to know? Well, I've learned to live with giving the socially graceful response, "I'm fine" and continue on my way. Facing new situations and unknowing people, I'm faced with the inevitable question, "How many children do you have?" Are they prepared to hear what I want to say? "I have two sons - my oldest son turned 14 and started high school this year and my youngest would be turning 10 this month, but he died in 2003."

Sometimes I can say it. Sometimes I need my mask.




autumn leaves under frozen souls hungry hands turning soft and old my hero Cried as we stood out there in the cold like these autumn leaves i don't have nothing to hold ...

#### In case you missed it...

child. Our helpful panelists were bereaved parents Debi Wilson-Smith (Christopher's Mom), Jane Schindler (Emily's mom) and Noel Castiglia (Tria's dad). They offered many wonderful ideas that may help you make a plan for that day on the calendar that can be so emotionally difficult.

For family gatherings at the table you can display and light a candle, or place a flower in a vase, maybe set out a small item that represents your child. For gift giving holidays, designate a special and caring person to go with you on a shopping trip where you can talk about your child and buy presents they may have enjoyed. Then you can donate the toy or book to a toy drive, either the one we offer at our monthly meeting in December or one of your choosing. On personal days of significance, maybe give gifts to your child's friends - they are grieving your child's death, too. Give your time and volunteer, give your love and hug someone who understands your pain.

Most of all, what seemed to be the recurring theme from all our speakers is that you need to make a plan for the upcoming day and give in your child's memory.



While your loss hurts, giving can help.


