You may feel the need to have a "safe" place to go, as you try to enjoy some of the pleasures of summer among new and caring friends. What better place to talk about <u>all</u> of our children freely - especially the ones we miss?

Our upcoming meeting on September 6 covers an important topic — "Making it Through the Holidays (After the Death of a Child)". Many Chapter members develop ideas that over the years have helped them cope with those difficult days we face on the calendar. Perhaps you have some ideas of your own you'd like to share with other members? A key thing I learned at my first Bereaved Parent's meeting was to make a plan for those days. Even if your idea is to stay in bed, plan to do it and let others know that is what you will be doing on that day. So please, mark your calendar and plan to join us for this usually well-attended discussion (with sharing groups to follow).

September can be a difficult time for many of us as we grieve the loss of our child or sibling. Another school year begins, days begin to shorten, temperatures begin to fall, summer distractions that may have sustained you for a time are now at an end. But, despite our loss, we can find beauty in some of these seasonal changes, so please try to go outside and experience them. Touch the comfort of a warm sweater that was tucked away in your closet. Smell the crisp, clean autumn air. Look at the deep, rich colors of the trees as they begin to change. Listen to the crackle made by fallen leaves on the ground as you walk over them. Most of all, feel the love you have for your child in everything with every step you take.

My days were forever changed after that dreaded phone call, Christmas Eve is now just another day. I wish this was some horrible nightmare But no, I have to deal with losing my brother somehow, some way.

There are days that I cry, scream, and sometimes just be by myself in silence There are walls I have built to keep people out Then come other days when I can smile and laugh and remember my brother as I know he would want me to.

Each day I push through, Some come easy and others aren't so easy, but I've come to learn that this is what the road of grieving is for me at this point in my life.

Tomorrows are not certain, this I know because I woke up one tomorrow and my brother was not there. He walks with me now in my heart and "our" butterfly shows me he's near. I still have his cell phone number from his last phone call he made to me the night before he died saved on my caller ID, I just can't seem to erase it.

Though it's been 19 months with him gone, it still seems like yesterday when he was here and I hope that feeling will last forever.

Many people don't understand why I am the way I am now, why I do the things I do. I simply say, Don't tell me who to grieve, don't tell me what to believe, life after a sibling death is one I'd rather not be living.

But there are many of you out there that do understand and to know that when I write about my grief and read the newsletters, it makes my heart feel a little bit better.

My Rain Barrel

I grew up in the hills of Western Pennsylvania on a very small farm, where my parents raised a few chickens and pigs, and had a large vegetable garden. Much of our summers were spent tending the garden, picking, canning and freezing vegetables. To this day, nothing tastes as good as a tomato picked fresh from the garden... strawberries and raspberries you picked yourself...or fresh corn on the cob.

Water was a very precious commodity. Our well would sometimes go dry during the hot spells of summer. My father always had several rain barrels set up by the garage and barn to catch the spring and summer rains. I can remember my sister and I splashing and playing in the rain barrels...and of course getting an earful afterwards! That water was needed for the garden.

I listened to the summer storm last night... thunder and lightning followed by a total downpour... and thought of how my life mirrors the storm, and the water in those rain barrels. My son died six years ago. On that day, my emotional storms were horrendous ... and for long afterward, that rain barrel of emotions continued to flow over. I tried getting a bigger barrel...it still overflowed! I couldn't control it no matter how hard I tried.

As we travel our life's journey, our "emotional rain barrel" fills and empties in response to the events and stressors in our lives. You've probably heard the platitudes about good stress and bad stress, and getting control of stress. Well, in my opinion, when you lose a child, the level of emotional stress in your life explodes like a hurricane. And who can control a hurricane? I think we just have to wait out the hurricane ... wait out the storm.

After a while, I was able to find ways to deal with the other stressors in my life ... work, family, finances, etc, to smooth those storms so they would only be a light summer shower. And even begin to find ways to reduce my emotional stress levels ... my virtual trips to the beach. Then when the storms of grief came, there would be more room in my rain barrel.

But believe me, that rain barrel still overflows quite often!

And I wouldn't have it any other way. Sometimes I want to feel the storms of grief; hear the thunder, see the lightning, and feel the downpour. I want to remember my son and cry for our loss ... and then play and splash in my rain barrel.

Say, it's nice to hear you laugh. Yes, I agree, the memories you shared are good. Look, we're half way there now; I can see the other side. It looks so warm and sunny. Oh, have you noticed? We're nearing the last stone and, you're standing alone. And look, your hands, you've let go of mine, and we've reached the other side.

But wait. Look back. Someone is standing there. They are alone and want to cross the stepping stones. I better go; they need my help. What? Are you sure? Why yes, I'll wait. You know the way - you've been there. Yes, I agree-it's your turn, my friend-to help someone else cross the stepping stones.
