

MONTHLY GATHERINGS:

January 9th. Calvary has a scheduling conflict with us for the Fellowship hall in the evening of January 9th. For this meeting we will meet in the Parlor. Park at the front of the church in the adjacent parking lot and come into the church through the front door. The gathering will still begin at 7:00 P.M.

Monthly Gatherings for 2020: January 9th; February 6th; March 12; April 2nd; May 7th; June 4th; July 9th; August 6th; September 3rd; October 1st; November 5th; and December 3rd.

Our doors open at 7:00 P.M. and the meetings start at 7:30 lasting until about 10:00 P.M. with clean-up taking until about 10:30 to 11:00.

CHAPTER MEETING SUMMARY: Calvary United Methodist Church • 301 Rowe Boulevard • Annapolis, MD 21401. Sharing groups, a key part of each Chapter meeting, will be held as desired for first-time attendees, and the newly and non-newly bereaved. Meetings are held on the first Thursday of every month beginning at 7:30 p.m. (Doors open at 7:00) and are open to anyone grieving the death of a child. Come around to the back of the church, there is parking and an entrance directly into our meeting. We are a self-help support organization dedicated to assisting parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles and siblings toward the positive resolution of grief following the death of a child. We provide information and education to extended family and friends. Our greatest strength as bereaved families are the unity, we find in shared experiences which can lead us out of isolation, give us a place to "belong," and offer us hope that together – we can make it.

WHAT TO EXPECT AT OUR CHAPTER MEETINGS: Our Chapter gathers one evening a month to address topics and offer support to those who are mourning the death of a child. Our meetings last for approximately 2-3 hours. Sometimes we schedule a 30-minute presentation at the beginning of our meeting. When the speaker or panel has concluded the presentation, we introduce ourselves and say our child's name. We then take a short break before dividing into sharing groups. Sharing groups are facilitated by fellow Chapter members and are completely confidential. During this time, the issues that are discussed—particularly for the newly bereaved—focus on the issues facing participants today.

CORE GROUP MEETINGS:

Quarterly Core Group Meetings for 2020: February 11th; May 12th; August 11th; and November 10th.

<u>WHAT TO EXPECT AT OUR CORE GROUP MEETINGS:</u> Everyone is invited and encouraged to attend our core group meetings. We are always looking for new ideas and programs.

A core group meeting typically meets from 7 pm until 9 pm. once a quarter and typically in Room 119. We discuss finances, upcoming activities, plan the annual walk, plan the service of remembrance, suggest programs for the monthly gatherings, and address any number of issues that may come before the group.

OTHER IMPORTANT DATES:

<u>December 6th – Service of Remembrance.</u> Since its beginning in 1985, the Anne Arundel County Chapter's Annual Service has provided an opportunity for parents, grandparents, siblings, aunts and uncles, and friends to remember our precious children. Please join us in this celebration of our children's lives as we face the Holiday Season with Love, Compassion, and Hope for all.

Dear friends,

I'd like to share with you a little about a recent trip I took this past October. Instead of a vacation I decided to attend a 7-day, Bereaved Parents Retreat in Ocean Isle Beach, North Carolina. The retreat was organized by Shirley Tripp-Johnson a bereaved mother I met online after my son Robby died. Shirley also has a Facebook group called Wings of Hope Living Forward. This was the first time I have ever driven this far alone (about 8 hours after stopping twice) or stayed with 39 people I had never met. I enjoyed every minute of my alone time driving down and back and look forward to future travels. I also fell in love with audible books while driving, it made time fly by. I haven't stopped listen to them yet!

Crossing the bridge off the mainland into the island was breathtaking! The big beautiful house was right on the beach and absolutely gorgeous! We even had an elevator in the house and a pool outside.

When I arrived, I walked into the entire group of all 39 people in the middle of the gift exchange. It was a little over whelming, but I added my gift and joined the game. After exchanging gifts, I was helped to get my bags and settle in my room with one of my roommates, Kimmy. Kimmy was just 2 months into this journey after losing her beautiful 4 year old daughter Harper and the youngest bereaved parent at the retreat. Our hearts all broke for her newness and rawness into this journey.

After unpacking I walked down the little walkway leading to the beach and sat on the steps and cried my eyes out wondering what I got myself into. I was overwhelmed from the drive, walking into the group, the size and the beauty of the house, the beautiful ocean and the anticipation of being new and not knowing anyone. I decided I would spend the night and, in the morning, tell them that I had to return home for some reason. After a few tears two bereaved moms walked up and started talking to me and I join them on the beach, and we shared about our children. By the time the morning came leaving was not an option. I started making lots of new friends, we shared stories of our children, we spoke their names over and over, we shared how they lived and how they died and how much they are loved and missed.

Every morning we had breakfast from 7 to 9 AM followed by a meeting from 10 to 12 then lunch, there was a gift exchange, a craft day, a dolphin cruise, a balloon release, a candle lighting ceremony and the final evening dinner at a local restaurant. The retreat was all inclusive and everyone signed up upon arrival to help with serving meals and cleaning up after meals. There was even a little downtime if you wanted to go exploring. I would wake up early each morning and take long walks along the beach. I even attended a local powwow on Native American tribal grounds with another one of my roommates, Sherry. While at the powwow we met another bereaved mom that was part of the ceremony, and she is now our friend.

The week flew by and when Sunday finally came it broke my heart to leave. There was lots of hugs and tears and we promised to stay in touch and find a way to see each other again. I will always treasure every moment spent with each one of my new friends. The bond that I made with my roommates is absolutely priceless. I am so glad I went, stayed and the friendship made.

I look forward to attending another retreat and hope if you get the chance you would give it a try also.



If I can be completely honest, those three fabricated words drive me nuts. Three words that actually sum up what is wrong with the world these days. We keep looking back hoping to fix what's in front of us. Shortly after Stephen died, a person said those words to me. This person said, "I know you must be playing the woulda, coulda, shoulda game right now."

Yes, it is true, someone actually said that.

My reply? "No, actually I am not. Even though I wish things could be different, I would not change the way I loved my son, nor would I expect him to have loved me any differently than he so beautifully did. If something happened to someone you love tomorrow, I hope you could say the same thing."

Yes, I did have "that" tone when I said it. And my left eyebrow may or may not have been elevated.

Was I a perfect parent? No. Was he a perfect child? I think so, but I suppose I may be slightly biased. But woulda, coulda, shoulda? Really? I was absolutely stunned that someone would say this to a mother who was grieving the recent loss of her child. Speechless, and let's face it. That does not happen to me very often.

This statement, early in my grief, shocked me. I just didn't see it coming. The person did not see the error in saying it. It was almost as if it was a given for her, a natural process in her own life to look back over her shoulder and "play the game", revisiting your actions and the actions of others with a focus on regret, blame, and shame. Looking to the past in the hopes that reflection can somehow change the reality that you are facing in the present.

But we all know you can't erase or change the past. So why do we spend so much time trying to do just that?

It never works. It can't. Looking back does one thing. It keeps you stuck. You cannot move forward as long as you are trying to affect change on the unchangeable. And how far do you plan on going back? To your most recent mistake? How about college? Hell, if we are playing the game, why not go back to that unfortunate incident in the third grade? If this game really worked, we would all spend our todays fixing our yesterdays.

Now, that is not to say that you can never look back and reflect on your life lessons in an attempt to improve yourself for the days and years ahead. That is a good thing. It is also not to say that you will never make any mistakes. No matter how great you live, you will always be imperfect by design. I am cringing right now thinking about some of my own "cringe-worthy" moments on my journey to now.

You also can't change the past for someone else. Many times, when we hurt, we look to the past, and say, "If she didn't do that to me, I could be happy."

Okay, but she did. And unless you are <u>Marty McFly</u> with a <u>DeLorean</u> and a mad scientist for a friend, you can't go back and change it. So what now?

So, today:

- o Promise yourself you are done playing that game. No more. Refocus yourself on the now. It will take work at first, but keep trying. It will happen.
- Imagine what your loved one would say to you. For me, I think about that chat with Stephen. I
 think he tells me daily to take all the love I have for him in my heart and give it away to those
 who need it.
