A Most Wonderful Thing....

A most wonderful thing occurred the evening of December 31, last year. As I was driving to get my best friend and her grandson to see the Symphony of Lights in Colombia, I, for almost the first time in 10 years - the first time since my precious William went to live on the other side of the rainbow - put on Christmas music.

I used to love listening to Christmas music, and as much as I love Thanksgiving, would start listening to it just after midnight of Halloween. I had at least 20 CDs I would go through and usually bought a new one or two to add to my collection every year. Listening to the joyous hymns or carols just brought me great joy, until my precious William died. After that, I could only listen



to a bar or two before having to shut the lovely and uplifting tunes off.

That was until New Year's Eve of 2021. That night I opened my Amazon music app and Bluetooth on my phone. The beautiful carols and hymns wafted through my stereo speakers in both the front and back of my car for almost the first time in ten long years, I was elated.

Off-key, I sang along with the music as I drove to get my friend and her grandson. She was equally happy with the carols as they both piled into my car. We listened and hummed and sang periodically as we drove westward toward the lights.

We stopped for drinks at the McDonald's in Arundel Mills. When I got back in the car, I realized I just could not take anymore of the joyous Christmas music and turned it off - or so I thought.

Somehow, when I got out on the road, melodious tunes wafted through my speakers, yet again. Only this time it was not Christmas music, it was Country Music. It was the same music William, Barb, I, and later, after he was born, Dakoda would listen to as we drove from here to yon when William was alive.

One of our favorite songs was Randy Travis', "Our Love is Deeper Than the Holler". It was the first song to play. I almost burst into tears thinking William had sent that directly to me, telling me that not only was he with us as we went to see the lights - just as in the olden days- but that he loved me, he loved us, so very, very much.

Relevant love song after relevant love song came on to reiterate his message. How could that have happened? I thought as I remembered myself trying to shut off the music completely. Goosebumps tickled me all over as I pondered that question. I could not figure that out, but was overjoyed at the thought of the songs so meaningfully sent from Heaven above.

This went on for hours as we found The "Symphony of Lights" in Colombia was closed to cars and only open for pedestrians. Both Barb and I are somewhat disabled. Spectacular fireworks exploded as we drove to and from the area.

We listened to a most beautiful love song as I illegally pulled over to partake of their magnificence. We were able to enjoy them for 5 or ten minutes before a policeman ushered us away. I was overjoyed by the experience and sang, again off-key, with the love song that was playing at the time. We drove eastward toward Sandy Point State Park to revel in the "Lights of the Bay" put on in order to benefit the SPCA.

It was a wonderful drive. When William was alive we enjoyed many a long drive to absolutely nowhere, just to be together to enjoy the sights, the music that played, and the sometimes intellectual and other times hilariously funny, conversations. The drives were always wonderful and we bonded even further each time.

That night was one such occasion. Though he did not speak through his mouth, his message, by choice of song, was obvious. He was right there in the car with us and he loved us greatly. That was such a powerful and glorious experience. I wouldn't have given anything for it, until I got home...

When I got home, the extraordinarily painful realization of the fact, that while my precious William was there in spirit those several hours and that caused me tremendous glee, he was not there in person. His warm, soft body was not there for me to hug. His sweet and beautiful, hazel-green eyes were not there for me to gaze into. His soft, deep baritone voice was not there for me to rejoice in. All of the precious gifts he had bestowed upon me the previous 4 hours melted away and I was left in a deep depression.

For days I could barely get out of bed. For days I could do little but eat. For days I lay slumped over in the bed, dwelling on not the glorious gifts he had given me, but the glorious treasure I had lost. For days I could not figure out how to get out of my slump. I felt horrible for the people I needed to get cards to. I had so many people I wanted to send a note of gratitude to for the lovely things they had given me or the kind words they had said that had eased my suffering, but I could barely move.

What, oh what could I do? Nothing. Nothing, of course. There was nothing I nor anyone else could do or say that could ever bring my precious, hazel-green eyed, stubbly chinned, baritone voiced, 27-year -old baby boy back. I was devastated.

I didn't see any way back, but little by little, light began to shine through the dark fog of pain. Little by little I began to see beautiful and brilliant flowers in what seemed only a sea of black. Little by little, I began to again see the treasures my precious William, guardian Angel and God had given me.

No, I did not have William to hold, not for the time being, anyway, but he did give me an amazing husband, an amazing grief counselor, another amazing son, an incredible grandson, an incredible new daughter-in-law and many, many, many amazing new friends.

Before William died, we basically only had three friends. We loved them and did not want for anything, but after William died, he sent me SO MANY of THE MOST AMAZING people anyone could ever want. He sent me the best people on EARTH!!! He sent me the family of the Bereaved Parents of the USA, Anne Arundel Chapter!!! How could I want for anything more???

Well, we all know the answer to that. We want our children back in our arms. We want them back spilling popcorn all over the couch and playing their music too loudly. But short of that, the most precious gift God could ever have given us is beautiful people - and those he gave me in full abundance!

What a treasure! What a gift! What a tremendous blessing! To be given such wonderful people to help guide me from the land of pain and suffering to the land of gratitude and appreciation is one of the greatest gifts Our Maker could ever have bestowed upon me.

To go from a world of abject pain and desperation to a world of glorious appreciation is not something to be taken lightly. It is positively MIRACULOUS!!! For how could a mother, whose beloved son was taken from her, whose reason for living was wrenched from her, ever not only BEGIN to have a modicum of happiness, but have a life filled with joy? How could that possibly be?

It can only be because our children are out there. Our Almighty is out there. They are out there - AND THEY LOVE US!!! They LOVE US and WANT US TO BE HAPPY!!

I am not sure why our children are gone. I am not sure why they were taken from this earthly realm, but they are definitely here in spirit. They walk beside us and wish for us all the happiness that is even remotely possible. They love us, as we love them. They see clearly the truths not available to them when they were here in bodily form. They see clearly now and love us beyond reason, for they see the love we have for them. They see our tears. They feel our pain, but they love us. They want us not to look at the precious gifts we lost, but at the tremendous gifts we were given. That most important of gifts: that we got to have our children, at all.

Whether it be only a quickening in a mother's womb or 65 years in the flesh, we were given the greatest treasure ever. We were given our children. For that we must be overwhelmingly and infinitely grateful. We are, without a doubt, the most wounded and most unfortunate because we lost our children. But we must never forget, we are also the most graciously, most abundantly, most magnificently blessed - because we got to have them.

I wish you hope and healing and the second most blessed gift of all, the gift of gratitude.

You ever think you could cry so hard that there'd be nothing left in you, like how the wind shakes a tree in a storm until every part of it is run through with wind? I live in the low parts now, most days a little hazy with fever and waiting for the water to stop shivering out of the body. Funny thing about grief, its hold is so bright and determined like a flame,

like something almost worth living for.I found this piece so deeply moving and poignant. The imagery is a perfect representation of the way grief shakes us to our core, a whole-body experience of loss and transition. But, the last part of this poem reminds us to hold onto hope: the grief sweeps through us with such determination because it is necessary and vital. It hurts and it takes from us, but it also leads us back to the light.

Instructions on Not Giving Up

More than the fuchsia funnels breaking out of the crabapple tree, more than the neighbor's almost obscene display of cherry limbs shoving their cotton candy-colored blossoms to the slate sky of Spring rains, it's the greening of the trees that really gets to me. When all the shock of white and taffy, the world's baubles and trinkets, leave the pavement strewn with the confetti of aftermath, the leaves come. Patient, plodding, a green skin growing over whatever winter did to us, a return to a strange idea of continuous living despite the mess of us, the hurt, the empty. "I'm planning on hiding. I know it won't work, but I don't know what else to do," Connie added.

Glenn and Connie's daughter Skylar grew up into a beautiful and rugged young lady. Her two brothers proudly took credit for the rugged part. Together they loved hunting, fishing, and the outdoors.

One summer vacations, the family camped at a gorgeous spot next to a river. Early one morning, during a tubing excursion down the river, Skylar's younger brother fell in and went under. Without hesitation, she went after him. As she tugged him to safety, Skylar was knocked unconscious. She slipped away quickly, as her brothers watched in horror. She was 15.

"She's our hero. How do we do Christmas, or any holiday for that matter, without her?" Glenn asked.

HOLIDAYS CAN BE TOUGH

Thanksgiving. Christmas.. New Year's. Valentines. Memorial Day. July 4. Labor Day. These are the times when families gather to enjoy one another and celebrate. For those of us enduring loss, these days are often devoured by the absence of our loved one.

Holidays are tough. They surface our losses in ways nothing else can, especially Thanksgiving and Christmas. Far from a celebration, these times seem more like some cruel joke. Surrounded by festive atmosphere, sparkling lights, and holiday décor, we sigh and weep. Holiday cheer is replaced by holiday sadness. We bump into a memory with every step.

What do we do with this? Some of us opt for hiding. We emotionally, and sometimes physically, lock ourselves in, hunker down, and wait for the present storm to pass. The sheer dread of the assault of memories can be paralyzing.

Yet, the holiday comes. Is it possible to meet it and somehow use it to honor our child and express our grief in a healthy way?

YES, but it's going to take some intentional, proactive thinking and decision-making

Let's consider for a moment. What about this holiday reminds us of our child? What fond memories does this time of year evoke? Is there something our child especially enjoyed? What are some of our favorite memories of them during this time? Is there a way to use this holiday to remember and honor them?

Here are some examples from other parents:

- Put a stocking up for them. Have everyone bring a card that reminds them of that child and put it in the stocking. Pass around the cards on Christmas Eve or morning and read them out loud.
- Wrap an empty box and put it under the tree, with the child's name on it. When presents are opened, pass it around and have each person share a memory.
- As a family, light a candle in remembrance, and share some memories.
- Have each family member write a brief letter or poem to your child. Read them out loud together at some point during the holiday.
- Enlarge a picture of your child. Provide markers and have family members or friends write messages on the picture. Display it during the holidays.
- Prepare a favorite dish of your child and include it in the holiday meal.
- During the holiday meal, take some time and focus on your child. Have those present share a memory.
- Do something completely new, like take a trip somewhere you've never been, and honor your child in some way during your time together as a family.

These are just a few examples. The key is being creative and proactive. We need a plan – even a simple one. In fact, simple is probably best.


Many are concerned activities like these will be too emotional and infuse the holidays with sadness. The truth is, things are already emotional. When families get toge3ther, everyone is hyper-aware of who's missing. Having a plan to honor our child gives our families an opportunity to share and grieve together in a healthy way.

Yes, it will be emotional, but that doesn't mean it can't be good.

The holiday will come. Be proactive. Be creative. Make a plan. Keep it simple.

We don't have to let the holidays crush us. Rather, with a little proactive decision-making we can us this time to express our grief in a healthy manner, honor our child, and love those around us.

We serve many folks out-of-state, out-of-area, those who are no longer able to or comfortable driving at night or live too far away and for many other reasons. So we will continue to hold virtual meetings at the same time as the in-person meetings.

This is doable, but requires a lot of work, more facilitators, and others getting smart on the ins-and-outs of running a virtual gathering and blending it with the in-person gathering.

WHAT TO EXPECT AT OUR CHAPTER GATHERINGS: Gatherings are open to anyone grieving the death of a child. We are a self-help support organization dedicated to assisting parents, grandparents, aunts, uncles and siblings toward the positive resolution of grief following the death of a child. We provide information and education to extended family and friends. Our greatest strength as bereaved families are the unity we find in shared experiences which can lead us out of isolation, give us a place to "belong," and offer us hope that together - we can make it along this grief journey.

Our Chapter gathers one evening a month to address topics and offer support to those who are mourning the death of a child. Our meetings last for approximately 2-3 hours. Sometimes we schedule a 30-minute presentation at the beginning of our meeting. When the speaker or panel has concluded the presentation, we introduce ourselves and say our child's name. We then take a short break before dividing into sharing groups.

SHARING GROUP INFORMATION: Sharing groups are facilitated by fellow Chapter members and are completely confidential. We may offer the following sharing groups, depending on the number of attendees, facilitators and discussion requirements.

First Time Attendees Sharing Group: Coming to a Chapter Meeting for the first time can be daunting, but listening and/or sharing will be helpful. This group is usually a smaller group to allow for more discussion of issues pertaining to very early grief and may include those attending for the first three times. We ask that you come to three meetings to truly grasp the benefit of learning, sharing and support from others.

Newly Bereaved Sharing Group: During the early years of grief, the issues that may be discussed will focus on the issues facing participants today. This group may include anyone who is feeling newly bereaved, regardless of the time on their grief journey.

Sibling Sharing Group: Parents, invite and encourage your children to join our monthly gathering and participate in the Sibling sharing group. Amanda Hughes, Sibling Support Coordinator, Anne Arundel County Chapter, BPUSA, will facilitate a Sibling Sharing Group during our monthly gatherings. BITS AND PIECES OF INFORMATION

Community Involvement: The Rev Marguerite Morris, who spoke at our Service of Remembrance last year, is a member of the ministerial staff of the Greater Mount NEBO A.M.E. Church, and bereaved mother of Katherine. She hosted a *Gospel Music Celebration of Life for Lives Lived* on October 23, 2022. The celebration featured musical groups from around the area to remember, honor, and celebrate the lives of our deceased children who brought us joy during their lives. Parents and family brought pictures or mementos for display to honor and celebrate the lives of the children they have lost.



Representatives from For Kathy's Sake, Burgers and Bands for Suicide Prevention, Bereaved Parents of the USA, Anne Arundel County Chapter, and several family members shared the many ways our children lived and died.

The celebration ended with the powerful voice of 10-year-old Jordan Brown.

Our Angel Gown Project: First, a little history... Our Chapter started sewing small gowns from donated wedding gowns, to be provided to parents when they lost their child through miscarriage, stillbirth or infant loss. Tawny Lopez and June Erickson spearheaded this mission by gathering gowns and organizing sewing bees at their home and at the church hall. Many of us participated in these gatherings. And donations were made to the Anne Arundel Medical Center several times.

However, people moved, times changed, and I ended up in charge. And then COVID came and we didn't make any deliveries for several years. Although we did send a set of gowns to the BPUSA National Gathering each year to be included in the raffle. As a result, I received several donated wedding gowns from across the country, with a special request to have the created angel gowns returned for personal donation to a local organization in their child's name. What a wonderful way to honor your child.

Last month, Bob and I delivered about 70 gowns to the Center for Infant and Child Loss at the University of Maryland School of Medicine. They will be sending gowns to all the hospitals in Maryland. So, our efforts will be reaching more bereaved parents.

"I can't thank you both enough for dropping by with the beautiful gowns for stillborn and miscarried babies. We are honored to forward these to hospitals across the state for families that I know will appreciate this generous gift."
